SARCC Thursday Rural Away Ride Report 1 Feb 2024 Ride Leader: Sven

10.00am Sky is clear. Temp around 20C, Very little wind. 16 intrepid riders assemble to commence the ride at the Rotunda at Lyndoch. Bernie (usually on time) arrives late and in record time readies his bike. Rob also late rushes his bike preparation and this has consequences.






Our route takes us initially through the familiar Barossa bikeway which is a lovely undulating pathway bordering the vineyards, which are looking very lush and almost ready for the annual harvest. Following the pathway we pass through Altona and Rowland Flat before passing Jacobs Creek. Upon reaching the Barossa Highway junction with the bike path we leave the path and take the back roads climbing towards Angaston (strategically avoiding Menglers Hill) but do encounter a hilly climb along Crennis Mines Road. We coast down into Angaston township and take morning tea at the very nice Sunrise Bakery where we could all sit under shelter and in view of the bikes.

Departing morning tea we head to the start of the Barossa Bikeway near to the beautifully restored Angaston Railway station and recreation area. Coasting down through the pine tree laden railway cutting and then past the Penrice works we are treated to very nice views of the Barossa Valley. We then continue to coast down through the vineyards towards Nuriootpa, turning left on the bikeway to Tanunda where we take lunch in a small park. A show of hands dictates we stay on the bikeway as we leave Tanunda and make our way again on the Barossa bikeway to Lyndoch

After lunch Rob advises in a panic he has left his car keys at lunch whilst John Agnew reports he has lost his gloves. Returning to where our cars are parked we find Rob's keys on his car roof and John's gloves lie on the ground at the rear of his car!! The ride was about 54km and elevation around 500m with less gravel and climbing than is usual for a Thursday ride.



We ride heading southerly leaving the township of Kanmantoo and leave the bitumen onto Plantation Road and head towards Disher Hill where a series of climbs leads us to the top and afford lovely distant views of the surrounding country side. Area is very dry and fields look sparse as it is the last week of summer after all. Once the ascent is completed we then ride in several long lovely downhill runs as we head towards the Murray River and Caloote. We encounter at close quarters Mum and Baby Kangaroo who get a bit confused and separate from one another and then dart backwards and forwards before Mum jumps a high fence. Baby then sees mum and follows at full pelt to then dive through the fence. The gravel roads are reasonable and allow us to average around 17kmh. Off course we love the corrugation sections!!! We reach Calootte and ½ lunch on the cliff top and 1/2 lunch at Zadows Landing.

After lunch we regroup and head up along Mungala Road with both temperature and wind rising. At the 41km mark we join Rathjen Road which on a Sunday carries plenty of traffic including cars with boats and caravans. We pass the aerodrome and decide to change course to leave the busy road and ride on Gravel again on Anders road. The temperature has risen a lot by now and the wind is strong and its tough riding. But we continue on. We again ascent Dishers Hill and then enjoy a lovely fast asphalt descent before a last gravel hill and a final descent into Kanmantoo. We cross several fords and bridges and surprisingly there is water about in several creeks.

A hot group complete the ride but who were still smiling at the end. We debriefed on the rear balcony of the District Hotel in Nairne in the company of live music to celebrate our ride completion.

MEMBER ARTICLES

Two Members who read the article about hot Waxing your chain – described as a Fad asked to review the wax emulsion system.

What is clear is Wax emulsion is 2 to 3 times more expensive than synthetic oils, doesn't like heavy rain, not tested as better for wear reduction, but excellent for the environment. You will have a clean chain often with less effort, there are efficiency and maintenance benefits to have a clean chain.
